BIOGRAPHY

Marcelo M. Suárez-Orozco's work focuses on the conceptual and empirical problems in the areas of cultural psychology and psychological anthropology with a focus on the study of immigration and globalization. He is author of numerous scholarly essays, books, and edited volumes including the award winning *Transformations: Immigration, Family Life, and Achievement Motivation Among Latino Adolescents*. Dr. Suárez-Orozco works have also been published in the likes of *Ethos*, *International Migration* (Geneva), *Anthropology and Education Quarterly* as well as the *Harvard Educational Review*. In 1997 along with his wife, Carola Suárez-Orozco he co-founded the Harvard Immigration Projects and began to co-direct the largest study ever funded in the history of the National Science Foundation's Cultural Anthropology division—a study of Asian, Afro-Caribbean, and Latino immigrant youth in American society. Dr. Suárez-Orozco has been Visiting Professor of Psychology at the University of Barcelona (Spain), Visiting Professor of Anthropology at the Catholic University of Leuven (Belgium), and Fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences, Stanford. Marcelo M. Suárez-Orozco, winner of multiple honors and awards, was elected to the National Academy of Education in 2004.
