
### Uniform Guidance Update

The new Federal grants management regulations known as "Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (2 C.F.R 200)," or the Uniform Guidance went into **effect December 26, 2014**.

\*All new awards and increments of funding made on or after December 26, 2014 will be subject to the new Guidance.\*

To support Brown's research community with the implementation of these new regulations, OSP is developing resources and tools to assist with interpreting these new regulations, implementing required policy and/or procedure changes, and tracking awards under the new guidance:

- 1. A new <u>Uniform Guidance Webpage</u> has been created to provide a resource to navigate the Uniform Guidance, to track Federal Agency implementations of the Uniform Guidance, and to post various FAQs and documents to help understand the new regulations.
- 2. A new field has been added to the Award record in Coeus *Uniform Guidance Effective Date*. The field is located on the Award Details Tab. The purpose of this field is to allow end users to see if the Uniform Guidance is applicable to an award and when the new regulations go into effect.



3. The Award Notice sent out from OSP will have updated language (see example below) to clarify that the award falls under the new federal grants management regulations. In addition, any new sponsor and/or award specific terms related to the Uniform Guidance will be highlighted. Please contact your Grant/Contract Accountant if you have any questions related to your award terms and conditions.

This award falls under the new federal grants management regulations known as the Uniform Guidance. The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) issued the "Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards" which consolidates, streamlines and supersedes eight existing OMB Circulars, including Circulars A-21, A-110 and A-133. All new federal awards and increments of funding made on or after December 26, 2014 are subject to the new Guidance. Grants.gov has a planned system outage from Saturday, February 14, 2015 at 12:01 AM ET to Tuesday, February 17, 2015 at 6:00 Am ET. Due dates that fall on or between February 13 and February 18, 2015 will move to February 19, 2015.

### Simplifying the NIH Policy for Late Application Submission

NIH expects applications to be submitted on time. In rare circumstances where on-time submission isn't possible (e.g., sudden severe illness of the PD/PI or the PD/PI's immediate family member), NIH has a late policy that was recently simplified for consistency across program announcements and requests for applications.

Permission to submit a late application is not granted in advance, NIH will consider accepting applications within the two-week window following the application due date. Acceptance of late applications will be made on a case-by-case basis, dependent upon the explanation provided in the cover letter submitted with the application.

See NOT-OD-15-039 for exceptions and steps that must be taken for an application to be considered under the late policy, as well as examples of reasons why late application will or will not be accepted.

### Notice on Salary Limitation on Grants, Cooperative Agreements, and Contracts

#### NOT-OD-15-049

Effective on January 11, 2015, the maximum direct salary that an individual can receive will increase from \$181,500 to \$183,300.

The notice reaffirms that "for the purposes of the salary limitation, the terms "direct salary," "salary," and "institutional base salary" have the same meaning and are exclusive of fringe benefits and facilities and administrative (F&A) expenses, also referred to as indirect costs. An individual's institutional base salary is the annual compensation that the applicant organization pays for an individual's appointment, whether that individual's time is spent on research, teaching, patient care, or other activities. Base salary excludes any income that an individual may be permitted to earn outside of the duties to the applicant organization".

#### How this affects current/future awards:

- No adjustments will be made to modular grant applications/awards or to previously established commitment levels for non-competing grant awards issued with FY 2015 funds.
- NIH competing grant awards with categorical budgets reflecting salary levels at or above the new cap(s) that are issued on or after the January 11, 2015 effective date, will reflect adjustments to the current and all future years so that no funds are awarded or committed for salaries over the limitation.

For awards issued in those years that were restricted to Executive Level II (see <u>Salary Cap Summary, FY 1990 – FY 2015</u>), including competing awards already issued in FY2015, if adequate funds are available in active awards, and if the salary cap increase is consistent with the institutional base salary, grantees may rebudget to accommodate the current Executive Level II salary level and contractors may charge at the higher level. However, no additional funds will be provided to these grant awards and the total estimated cost of the contract will not be modified.

Brown's NIH Salary Cap Worksheet has been updated to reflect the increase.

### Update to the Proposal & Awards Policies & Procedures Guide (PAPPG)

The NSF Proposal and Award Policies and Procedures Guide (PAPPG) has been revised to implement 2 CFR § 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance). The Uniform Guidance incorporates language from eight existing Office of Management and Budget (OMB) circulars into one consolidated set of guidance in the Code of Federal Regulations. As mandated by OMB, the new PAPPG went into effect on December 26, 2014.

### New Steps to Enhance Transparency and Accountability at the National Science Foundation

NOTICE: IN-137

Effective December 26, 2014, NSF's updated Proposal and Award Policies and Procedures Guide (PAPPG) includes the following statement about award abstracts: "Should a proposal be recommended for award, the PI (Principal Investigator) may be contacted by the NSF Program Office for assistance in preparation of the public award abstract and its title. An NSF award abstract, with its title, is an NSF document that describes the project and justifies the expenditure of Federal funds." This update in the PAPPG clarifies the possible role of the PI in helping NSF prepare award abstracts. The nature of requested assistance from PIs is a valuable effort to help NSF adhere to its newly established guidelines.

The NSF public award abstract consists of both a nontechnical and technical component. The nontechnical component of the NSF award abstract must:

- Explain the project's significance and importance; and
- Serve as a public justification for NSF funding by articulating how the project serves the national interest, as stated by NSF's mission: to promote the progress of science; to advance the national health, prosperity and welfare; or to secure the national defense.

### Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Open Access Policy

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has adopted a new Open Access Policy for all peer-reviewed published research, funded in whole or in part by the foundation, that requires researchers to publish results in immediate open access journals. The policy went into effect January 1, 2015 for all newly issued grants, but allows for a two-year transition period during which grantees are allowed to publish up to 12 months in subscription-based journals, after which the article will be open to the public. - The <u>Data Management Plan</u> and <u>Mentoring Plan</u> attachments will no longer be attached to the R&R Other Project Information form as "Other Attachments." They will be attached to the NSF Cover Page where specific fields have been created to house the documents.

# **POST-AWARD / WORKDAY UPDATE**

### > Workday Roles and Access for Awards

Roles in Workday contain pre-defined rights that enable the user to perform specific tasks. The role(s) assigned to a position determines a worker's access in Workday, tasks they can complete and reports they can generate.

There are five roles in Workday that pertain to sponsored award management functions, including effort reporting. The following table describes the role and how to request the role.

Role	Description	How to Obtain Access
Grant Manager	Approval of sponsor funded financial processes relating to staffing and expenditures.	Coeus Access Form completed. Upon approval Coeus is updated and role is assigned via Coeus to WD integration.
Grant Financial Analyst	View only access to grant financial information for the department's grants.  • View Financial Data  • Access to Sponsored Award Reports  • Access to the Manager Budgetary Balance Report	Coeus Access Form completed. Upon approval Coeus is updated and role is assigned via Coeus to WD integration.
Principal Investigator	View the Manager Budgetary Balance Report for their sponsored awards. Review, certify or send back Effort Certification Report for Graduate Students working on their award(s).	Automatically assigned via Coeus to WD integration.
Co-Investigator	View the Manager Budgetary Balance Report for their sponsored awards.	Automatically assigned via Coeus to WD integration.
Effort Certification Partner	Review, make changes and submit Effort Certification Reports.	Contact Effort Reporting Manager – Maria_Mento@brown.edu
Worker – Faculty, Exempt and Non-Exempt Staff, and Undergraduate Students	Review, certify and send back Effort Certification Report.	Automatically have role in WD.

<sup>\*</sup>Note\* - A worker must also have the Cost Center Manger role in order to review payroll detail for workers within their cost centers and on their sponsor awards. The Cost Center Manager or Cost Center Reporting role is requested via REMEDY and assigned by Workday Operations.

## > GOING LIVE: Workday Effort Reporting for Faculty, Graduate Students, and Exempt Staff

On February 2<sup>nd</sup>, Workday Effort Reporting functionality for faculty, graduate students, and exempt staff will go live and all effort reports will be distributed and certified online.

#### **Highlights:**

- Replaces our current paper effort reports and manual distribution and certification processes.
- Allows for the online distribution and certification of effort.
- All faculty and exempt staff will be responsible for certifying their effort.
- Principal investigators will be responsible for certifying the effort for all graduate students working on their sponsored awards.
- The Effort Certification Summary Report, is available to Effort Certification Partners, and it allows them to easily track the status of their effort reports.
