




Breakfast (ientaculum); lunch (prandium, from which post-prandial);




Tripartite structure to evening meals, the cenae.

- gustum, gustatio or promulsis (appetizer): raw or cooked vegetables; salads, mushrooms, fish, oysters, shellfish, dormice; egg dishes
  - 'from soup to nuts' for us, in Latin 'ab ovo usque ad mala' (from the egg to the apples')
- mensa prima ('first table') caput cenae ('head of the dinne'r; chief dish): dishes varied in number from 2 to 7 meats, game, fish: accompanied by wine
- mensa secunda (second table): dessert: fruit and sweet confections, though could have salted dishes, cheese, sausages (savory zing to end of meal)

Martial (late 1st century AD poet):

'The eighth hour provides time for the sleek gymnasia, and the ninth bids us to sink down on cushions which have been piled high' (exercise, then eat...)







Cena = dinner

Convivium (convivia) = dinner party private banquet






The 'Unswept Floor' mosaic

### Symposium vs. Convivium

Really, Paetus, I advise you, as something which I regard as relevant to happiness, to spend time in honest, pleasant and friendly company. Nothing becomes life better, or is more in harmony with its happy living. I am not thinking of physical pleasure, but of community of life and habit and of mental recreation, of which familiar conversation is the most effective agent; and conversation is at its most agreeable at dinner-parties. In this respect our countrymen are wiser than the Greeks. They use words meaning literally 'co-drinkings' or 'co-dinings' (symposia, syndeipna), but we say 'co-livings' (convivia) because at dinner parties more than anywhere else life is lived in company' (Cicero, in a letter to a friend)

'taking meat without the company of a friend is like the life of a lion or a wolf' (Seneca)




## The pyramidal structure




A = lectus medius

B = lectus imus


C = lectus summus




Good view from 'power corners' (marked by arrows)



### Seating plan











Scenes of the arena, the 'games'




Herakles and Dionysos Paris, Judging Goddesses






His body hair irs plucked away, and he is kept beardless; he is forced to keep awake all night, dividing his time between his master's drunkenness and his lust (Seneca)






Any upside? Analecta = leftovers Observers of humiliation
