



Roman reliefs showing death of Opheltes

- Lykourgos (priest, or king)
- Opheltes (his son, later called Archemoros = doom-bringer"
- Hypsipyle (slave woman)
- The "Seven against Thebes"






The Hellenistic stadium at Nemea, excavated in the 1980s
















