4-yearly "Bear Festival" for Artemis, goddess of wild animals and virgin girls



In celebration of his defeat of Oenomaus...

Pelops founded the Olympic Games to honor Zeus

Hippodameia established the Heraia to honor Zeus's wife Hera

See Pausanias 5.16.2-7 (*Arete* # 158)

Stade races: **Olympic Games and** Heraia use feet of different lengths Gymnasion Hera temple (200 "Hera-feet") Paläst Festplata Zeus temple (200 "Zeus-feet")

Pausanias gives us valuable information about women spectators at Olympia...

...or, rather, the lack of them.

See *Arete* #149:

- proscription on female attendance at the Games
- the story of Kallipateira, after which...
- all trainers, like the athletes, must attend in the nude

But what about *Arete* # 150?

"They do not prevent virgins from watching the Games"

So how and when did total nudity become the norm?

The boxing boys from Santorini



Nude practice and contest in the gymnasium [remember, Greek word gymnos = naked] Orsippos of Megara 15th Olympiad (720 BC)

Discarded or accidentally dropped his loincloth while running in the stade race

Kyon (dog) + *desmos* (leash) -> *kynodesmai* (dog's leash)
