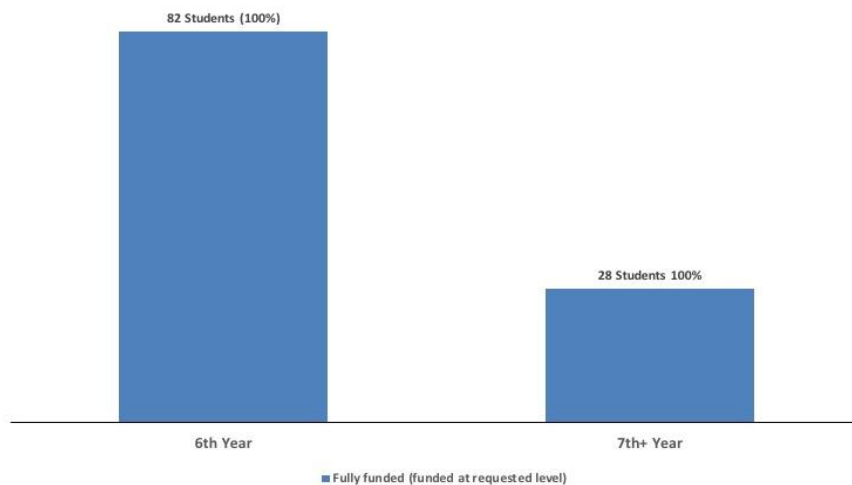


DCP and DEP Funding Requests and Awards for 2018-2019

Funding Requests and Awards

as of 3/30/2018

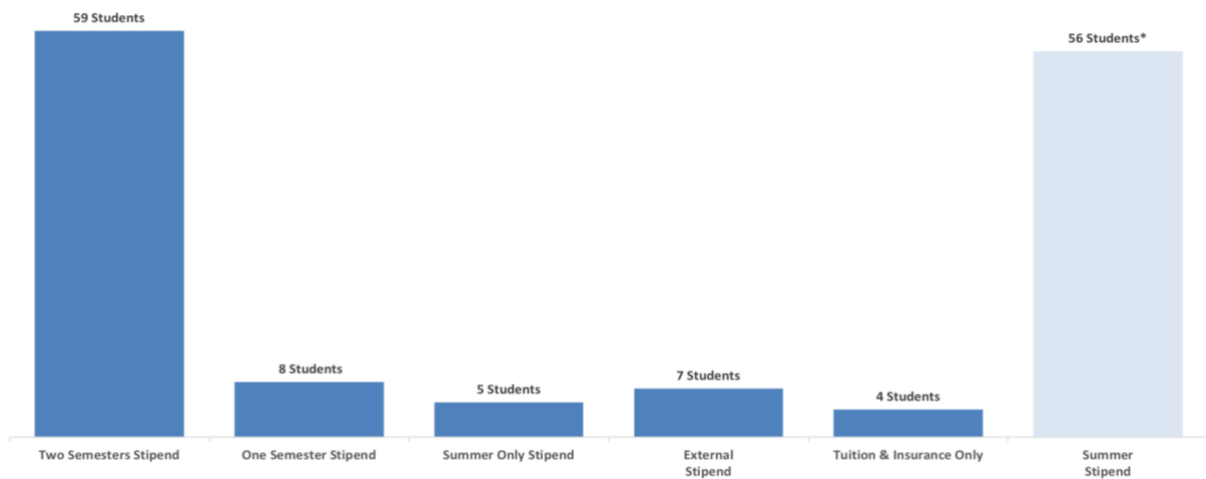
For 2018-2019, the Graduate School received total of 114 requests for funding support, consisting of 82 Dissertation Completion Proposal (DCP) requests from rising sixth-year students in the Humanities and Social Sciences and 32 Dissertation Extension Proposal (DEP) requests from students entering year 7 and beyond (as of 3/30/18). All requests were fully met.

as of 3/30/2018

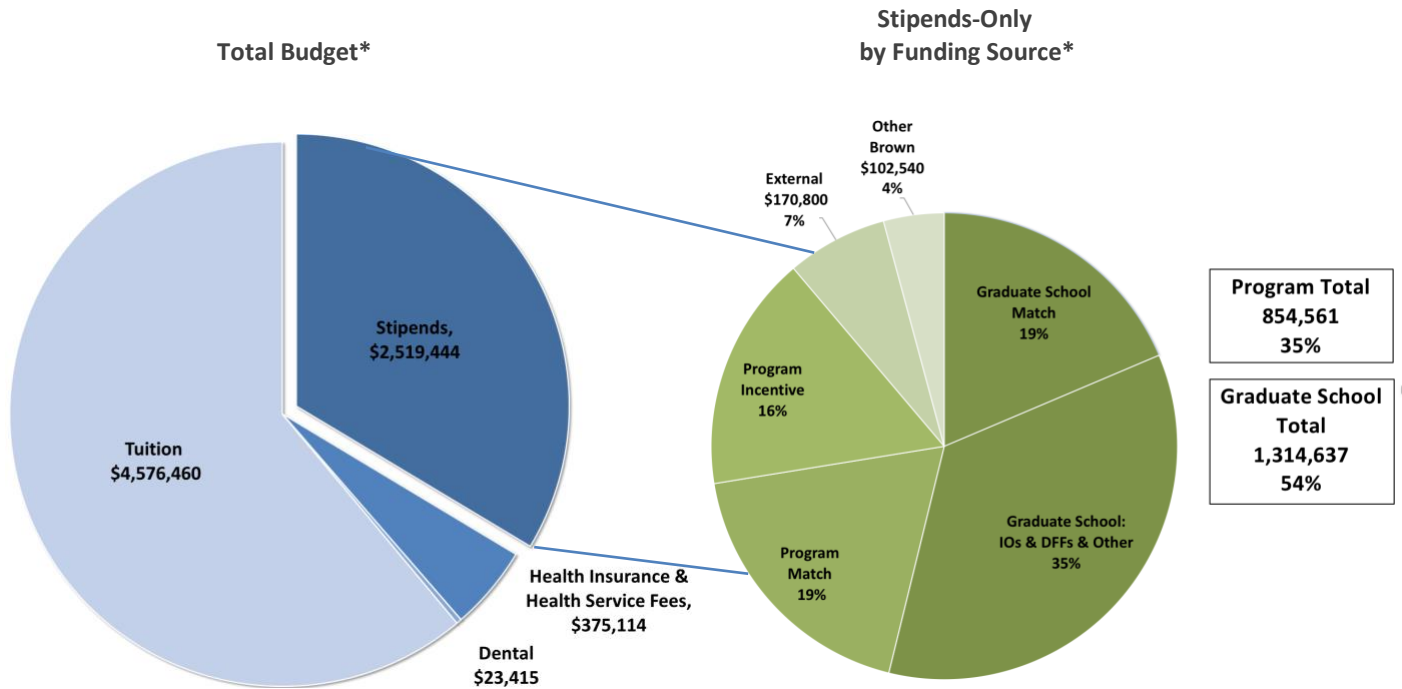
Sixth-year Dissertation Completion Proposal (DCP) funding requests included requests for the full academic year support and summer, one semester of support and summer, summers only, or tuition and insurance only.



*Summer stipend numbers include students in other categories, where applicable, excluding students who applied for Summer Only Stipend. All awards include health and dental insurance unless waived. Students on leave in 2017-2018 not eligible for summer.

6th-Year Funding Budget
as of 3/30/2018

Funding for sixth-year support is drawn from a number of sources, internal and external to the University, with total support totaling almost \$7.5 million dollars and stipends-only totaling over \$2.5 million dollars.



*Budget figures are subject to change as students decline aspects of the award and external awards are received.

For the 2018-2019 year, 7% of students received external funding to support their sixth-year stipend. An additional 16% percent of students qualified for guaranteed sixth-year funding through previously having received a substantial external award through the Incentive Policy. An additional 35% of rising sixth-year students will be supported through Graduate School distinctive opportunities programs, including the Interdisciplinary Opportunities, Deans' Faculty Fellows, Brown-Wheaton Faculty Fellows Program, and Academic Administration Proctorships. A match between the Graduate School and the Programs will support 38% of students for the coming year. An additional 4% of rising sixth-year students have received fellowships through other Brown sources, including the Cogut Center for the Humanities and other opportunities.
