

## Resources for Students

The following resources are available to you any time throughout the semester. Please do not hesitate to use them!

- **Office hours.** What are office hours? Office hours are times when your instructor or TA is always available to help you. You can use them to ask specific questions about homework, or to ask for clarification of material covered in class, or to receive more general guidance. All instructors hold office hours at least 2 hours per week. You do not need an appointment; you can just show up at the instructor's office during these times. Most instructors will also be happy to give you an appointment at different times or days if you ask them in person or by email.
- **Math resource center (MRC).** The Math Resource Center is a free walk-in help center designed for students taking calculus and other math courses (MA 60 - MA 540). The MRC is staffed by 1-2 graduate students and 2-3 undergraduates per night who help students on an individual or small group basis. MRC is held in Foxboro Auditorium Monday-Thursday from 8 to 10 in the evening. Some students like to work on their homework at MRC, alone or in groups, knowing that tutors are available to answer questions when they get stuck. For more information see:
